CONTINUING EDUCATION IN CLINICAL TOXICOLOGY

In order to provide Continuing Education in Clinical Toxicology (CECT), the EAPCCT Scientific and Meetings Committee has arranged a TOXUPDATE. This one-day symposium will include state-of-the-art presentations on:

- Investigation of the poisoned patient – to include both talks and case studies

SCIENTIFIC PROGRAMME

Wednesday 12 - Friday 14 May 2010

The themes for the Congress are shown below and abstracts on these topics would be particularly welcomed:

- Paracetamol toxicology – what's new?
- Optimising research in poisons centres
- Preparedness for unusual toxic outbreaks
- Toxic alcohols
- Management of drug and alcohol withdrawal
- Critical care.

Plenary lectures

There will be up to three plenary lectures with invited speakers who are acknowledged experts in their fields.

Poster discussion sessions

As in Stockholm there will be a poster discussion session as part of the programme where posters of special interest or controversy are discussed.

Young Investigator's Award

A Young Investigator's Award will again be presented this year. A shortlist will be chosen by the Scientific Committee on the basis of the quality of the abstracts submitted. The winner will receive an honorarium of Euro 1000. To be considered for the award the person applying must fulfil the following criteria:

- Young investigators are defined as <40 years of age on the last day of the Congress (Friday 14 May 2010). This will be confirmed prior to the prize being awarded by passport check.

- The young investigator must be the principle investigator of the research being presented. This means that they have taken the lead in performing the research and are the most appropriate person to present the research at the Congress. It is acceptable for the young investigator to have research collaborators over the age of 40 and these can be listed on the abstract. This might include a research supervisor.
- The research submitted must be original and must not have been published or presented at another conference.
- Applicants do not need to be members of the EAPCCT but they must be present at the Congress to present the research.
- Previous winners are not eligible.

Judging the winner

Those on the final shortlist will be invited to make an oral presentation of their work at the Young Investigator session at the Congress. Oral presentations for the award will take place in one session. The quality of presentations will be judged by at least 3 senior judges who are invited to do this by the Scientific Committee. These judges will not have relevant conflicts of interest. The judges will score each presentation and at the end of the session will come to a consensus on which presentation should receive the award. The decision of the judges is final.

Assistance with abstracts

Members of the Board and Scientific Committee are ready to help scientists who are not used to presenting data and structuring an abstract. If you think that a review of your abstract before final submission might help you, please feel free to send your abstract as soon as possible to Vincent Danel: VDanel@chu-grenoble.fr

Please note that this pre-review process is not a guarantee of acceptance of your abstract by the Scientific Committee.

ABSTRACT SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

General notes

- The EAPCCT Scientific and Meetings Committee, chaired by Martin Wilks will evaluate the abstracts. The Scientific and Meetings Committee's decision will be final.
- **Abstracts must be submitted by midnight on Wednesday 18 November 2009** to be considered by the Scientific Committee. If you request help with English it is important to submit well before the final submission date. If you submit after 11 November there is no guarantee that there will be time to supply help with English before the review process starts.
- All abstracts accepted for presentation at the Congress will be published in the journal Clinical Toxicology. The decision of the Scientific and Meetings Committee in this regard will be final. There will no longer be a category of abstracts accepted for the Congress but not published in Clinical Toxicology.
- **No abstract received after 18 November 2009 will be considered for the meeting, unless agreed in advance by the Chairman.**

On-line abstract submission

- ALL abstracts should be submitted electronically via the EAPCCT website <http://www.eapcct.org>. Detailed instructions for this are provided on the website.
- Instructions given below must be adhered to strictly. As time does not permit return of inadequately prepared abstracts for revision, they will be rejected! An exception may be made for minor correctable errors, at the discretion of the Scientific Committee.
- Submission of the electronic form signifies understanding of, and agreement with, all the conditions set out below.

If you have no Internet access or experience technical problems

- If you do not have access to the Internet, or you encounter technical problems that prevent you from submitting on-line please contact the Congress Secretariat (sc@eapcct.org) who will assist with technical problems, or make arrangements for you to submit via e-mail or mail if necessary.

Abstract format

There are changes to the submission process from previous years so please read the instructions carefully. The instructions give the general guidance for format although the electronic submission tool will format much of your abstract automatically. However, you are strongly advised to pre-prepare your abstract, using the guidance notes below, **before** attempting to submit your work on-line, since each session on-line is time

limited. You will be asked to upload a back-up version of your abstract (preferably prepared in Word), with a separate file if a table is included. **Note: Graphs and other figures are no longer permitted.**

- Authors should be listed using the entire surname and the initial(s). Omit titles, degrees, and academic appointments and do not separate initials with punctuation e.g. Smith MP
- The affiliation must comprise ONLY department name, institution, city, state/province and country.
- The body of the abstract should be organised as outlined below. You **must** include the underlined words in the body of your abstract (do not attempt to underlined these in your submission). Please note that our system requires the presence of the colon (:) after these underlined words to recognise them as headings. You must therefore use the colons, e.g. Objective:
- Objective: A statement of the purpose or reason for the report. Methods: A brief description of the study design. Results: A summary of the results presented in sufficient detail to support the conclusion. Data must be presented in the abstract. Statements such as “the results will be presented” or “other data will be presented to support...” will result in automatic rejection of the abstract. Conclusion: a statement of the conclusion based on the data presented. References: All references should appear at the end of the abstract in numerical order as they appear in the text. Ensure references are cited in the text by a number in parentheses e.g. (23). Follow the referencing style below. Generally reference numbers should be limited to 5 or less (10 or less for an invited lecture).
- References for **Journal articles** should be formatted as in the following example: Giannini L, Vannacci A, Missanelli A, et al. Amatoxin poisoning: a 15-year retrospective analysis and follow-up evaluation of 105 patients. Clin Toxicol 2007; 45: 539-42.
- References for **Book chapters** should be formatted as follows: Goadsby PJ. Pathophysiology of headache. In: Silberstein SD, Lipton RB, Dalessio DJ, eds. Wolff's headache and other head pain. 7th ed. Oxford, England: Oxford University Press, 2001:57-72.
- For case reports or case series, the words Case report: or Case series: replace the Methods: and Results: headings. Otherwise, the format remains the same.
- Reports of non-clinical studies, such as those describing poisons centre operations or educational tools should attempt to follow these guidelines as closely as possible.
- The number of words is limited strictly to **350** excluding the title, authors and affiliations or 250 words plus one simple table. Each word or number is counted as one word whether it is one character or 10 characters long. (The previous sentence has a word count of 18). Units will count as part of the number with which they are attached. The sentence “The patient’s salicylate concentration was 1000 mg/L” has a word count of six.
- For plenary lectures, keynotes and presentations for the educational Precongress there will be no general requirement to submit an abstract.

- A set of 3-5 learning objectives which give a clear summary of the topics to be covered **must** be provided by **Wednesday 27 November 2009** to allow CME credits to be awarded and to supply sufficient information for the Scientific Committee.
 - Speakers may if they wish submit an abstract of up to 1000 words (including up to 10 references or 900 words if including a table) for peer review by the Scientific Committee and publication in Clinical Toxicology alongside the other abstracts. This must be submitted by **Wednesday 27 November 2009**.
- Please do NOT use automatic Word functions, e.g. numbering, bullet points or footnotes.
 - Use of tables creates editorial difficulties and these are therefore discouraged. However, you may include **one simple** table. If a table is used the word count must be cut by 100 (i.e. to 250 words).
 - Figures and graphs/diagrams are no longer allowed.
 - Please be aware that the on-line submission system removes all special formatting, including bold, italic, underline, superscript, and subscript. Necessary formatting, e.g. H₂O and similar, will be replaced in your abstract (if accepted for the Congress) prior to publication. Please also be aware that on-line submission may also affect the appearance of Greek and other symbols – to avoid confusion please spell them out in full (if possible), e.g. “beta-blocker”, “micrograms”.
 - Use only standard abbreviations. As there is no incentive to using smaller words, non-standard and extensive abbreviations will only detract from your abstract’s acceptability. Numbers may be used to replace words, e.g. 5 rather than five, though the word count remains the same.
 - An example of abstract style is printed at the end of this section. This represents how abstracts will appear in the Congress book.

Notification of abstract receipt

- The on-line submission tool will allocate your abstract a unique identification number at the start. Please note this for your own records.
- A confirmation message will be displayed at the end of on-line submission. We recommend you **print** a copy of this for your records as well.
- Please note that after successful on-line submission it is NOT necessary to provide documentation by mail or e-mail.
- Submitters will be notified of the acceptance or rejection of their abstract by **Friday 29 January 2010**. Authors who have provided an e-mail address will receive this notification via that e-mail address.
- All abstract presenters will be asked to return a form by e-mail confirming their intention to attend the meeting. Please send this back promptly so that we know you have received our notification of acceptance.

- All abstract presenters must register for the Congress by **Friday 19 February 2010**. Failure to do so will result in the abstract being withdrawn from publication in the journal *Clinical Toxicology*, and will result in administrative rejection of the abstract.

- from a country on the inclusive list

Applicants will need to provide a current CV, and have had an abstract accepted for oral or poster presentation at the meeting. Awards include reduced rate registrations (at the existing student rates) and guaranteed free admission to the pre-congress continuing education day.

BORDEAUX

Bordeaux has a population of approximately 1 million in the metropolitan area and is situated on the south west of France on the Atlantic coast. The area is famous for wine. Bordeaux the 6th French capital was founded in the 3rd century BC (its name was Burdigala), and was administrated for three centuries by the British government (12th-15th century). The city built its wealth on this location, taking from soil and climate the best wines of the world and building around the river's main port of France (1750) and one of the greatest European centres and trading of trade. 1,810 hectares, of which 4,455 in the city, have been inscribed on the World Heritage

List in June 2007, the first urban complex on an area as vast and complex, distinguished by the World Heritage Commission of the UNESCO since its creation. Bordeaux is also famous for its 53 sites, monuments and museums open to visitors.

The Bordeaux region also includes the largest cultivated forest of Europe (1,700,000 ha, one of the first vineyards in the AOC (Appellation d'Origine Contrôlée: "controlled term of origin" is the French certification granted to certain French geographical indications for wines) world (110,000 ha), the highest dune in Europe (the Dune du Pyla, 105 m high), and the Atlantic beaches.

HOTEL

The EAPCCT Scientific and Meetings Committee have negotiated a contract with the Palais de Congrès for hosting of the Congress and providing accommodation for our delegates in a number of hotels close to the Congress centre, which are off varying standards and prices. Arrival in Bordeaux

By air

Bordeaux-Mérignac Airport has flights from Amsterdam, London (Gatwick and Luton), Paris (Charles de Gaulle and Orly) among other cities.

The Jet'Bus departs from Terminal B, arrivals level and connects Bordeaux Airport with Bordeaux train station via the city centre every 45 minutes, 7 days a week (journey time 45 minutes, depending on traffic; cost Euro 7 [to 31 Dec 2009]).

By train

It may be easier for many Congress attendees to arrive by train from e.g. Paris. Bordeaux is well connected by train and a TGV (fast train) from Paris Montparnasse takes ~ 3 hours to reach Bordeaux. Reservations are compulsory and you can book tickets at

Banking services and currency

France uses the Euro. All major credit cards are widely accepted in hotels, shops and restaurants. Cash can also be withdrawn from most ATMs and they often provide instructions in different languages. Banks are usually open from 8.30 am to 12 pm and from 2.30 pm to 5 pm on weekdays only.

Clothing

In May the average high temperature is 19⁰C (67⁰F)

Electricity supply

Electricity is 230V. Plugs are the European type with two round pins. Your 220V appliances may be plugged into a French outlet with an adaptor, though their 110V cousins (e.g. from North America) may require a transformer. Some electric devices – shavers and most laptops – work on both 110V and 220V. Adaptors are quite difficult to find in the city, except in 5 star hotels. They are usually available in airports.

Health and water

Bordeaux presents no health problems to the sensible traveller. The water is safe to drink.

Insurance

In registering for the XXX Congress of the EAPCCT, participants agree that neither the Scientific and Meetings Committee nor the EAPCCT assume any liability whatsoever. Participants are requested to make their own arrangements regarding health and travel insurance. The organisers cannot be held liable for any accidents, theft, damage to property, delays, or any modification in the programme due to unforeseen circumstances.

Language

The official language of the conference will be English. Simultaneous translation will not be provided.

Time

Local time will be GMT +2 hours.

Tipping

You do not need to tip in France, as service charges are included in every restaurant by law, and also included in the fare that you are quoted in a taxi. It is common however to leave around 7% for a waiter in a restaurant if you are really satisfied. In bars, the French often leave a small change as tip, as well as for hotel porters and toilet attendants.

Transportation

The transportation network of Bordeaux is called Tbc (Tram et bus de la CUB (Communauté Urbaine de Bordeaux [Urban Community of Bordeaux])). There are more than 90 lines in 27 municipalities of the CUB. You can find information on <http://www.infotbc.com>. It is possible to travel 20h out of 24, with a single ticket for the tram and Bus. Tram runs from 5am to 1am the next morning. The network serves all municipalities of the CUB from 5h to 21h. Beyond this time, the evening network

connects all the municipalities to the tram or to the city centre of Bordeaux, from 21h30 until last departure of the tram to 1am.

The principle is simple: 1 trip, you can move freely throughout the network for one hour (between the first and the last validation). During this time, connections and trips are free. The ticket must be validated on entering the bus or tram, even in the case of a transfer.

We are negotiating for free transport passes, which may be provided for delegates for the days of the Congress.

There are several different types of tickets: for 1 (Euro 1.40), 5 (Euro 5.20) or 10 travels (Euro 10.30), and combined tickets which allows to leave your car on a parking and take a bus or a tram (Euro 3.00). There are also travelcards for 1 day (Euro 4.10) or 7 days (Euro 10.10). They are sold in tobacco and newspapers shops, automatic tickets sellers located on each station of the tram network, and from the internet site.

Taxis

Taxis are plentiful but are quite expensive in Bordeaux. The price you pay is divided into two parts: the initial charge and the journey. In all cases, the driver may charge you a minimum price of Euro 5.80. It includes an initial package of Euro 2 plus possibly a few extras: Euro 0.74 for bags weighing more than 5 kg, Euro 1.41 for the 4th person, Euro 0.68 for a journey beginning at the station or airport. Taxis may only take cash.

Visas and immigration

A valid EU or US passport entitles you to a three-month stay in France. Delegates from many other countries also do not require visas but **Congress delegates are advised to check these arrangements with their local French Embassy.**

The EAPCCT Congress Treasurer can provide confirmation by e-mail of payment of Congress registration fees by delegates or acceptance of papers for presentation on request. Formal letters of confirmation of payment will also be included in the delegate packs. Please e-mail sc@eapcct.org. The General Secretary can provide letters of invitation for those who have abstracts accepted and require a visa but allow plenty of time as response from embassies is often very slow.
